# RSHDL's Mission

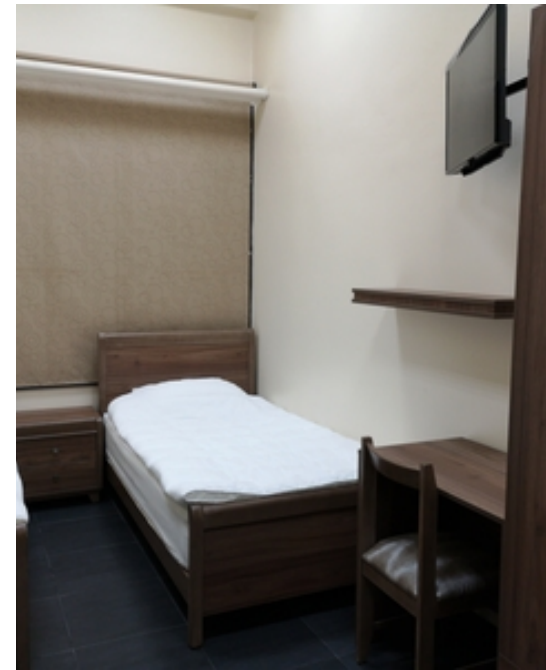


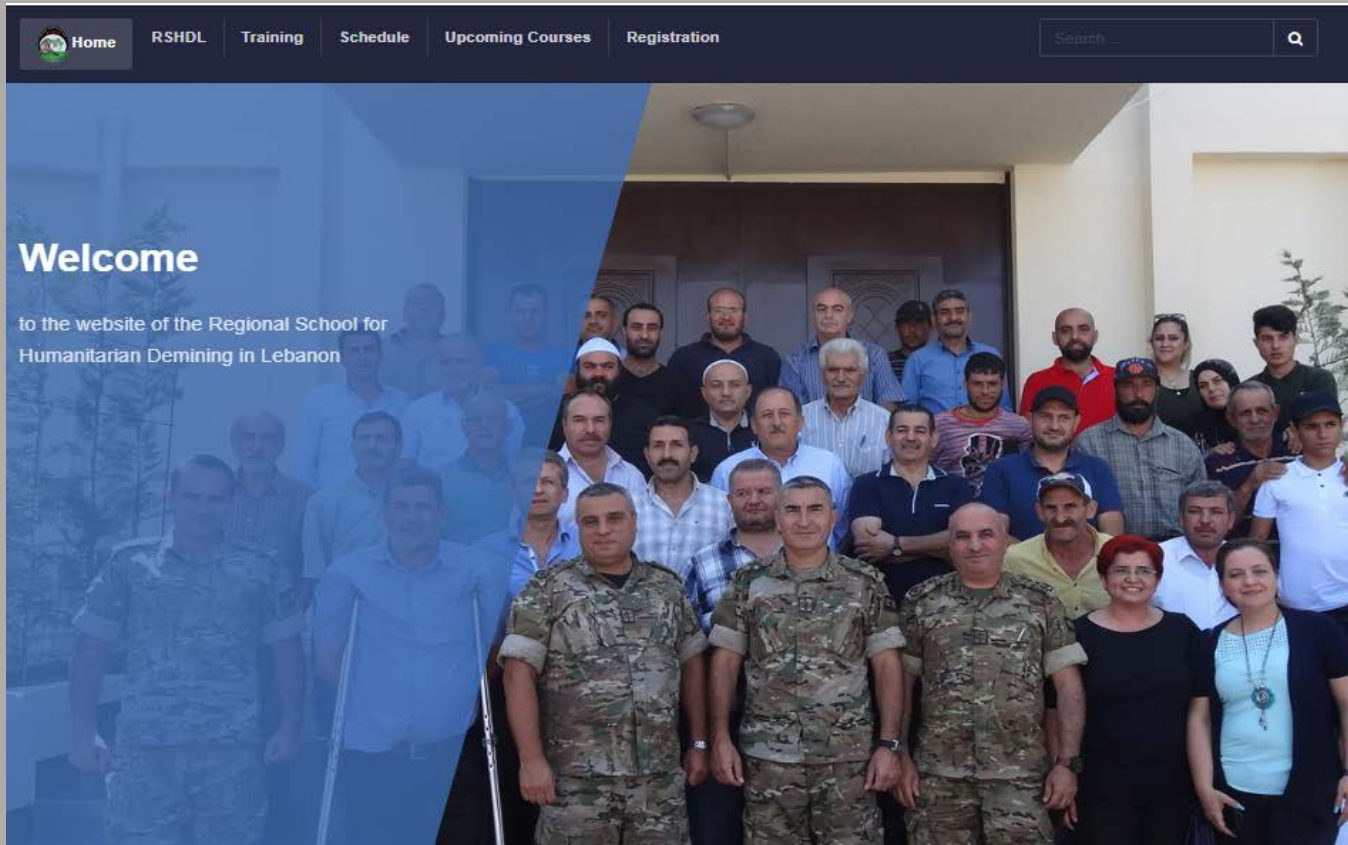

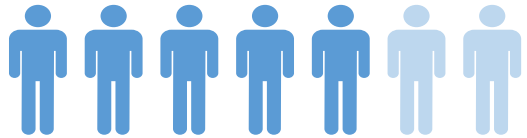

### Number of trainees by course





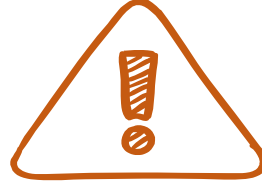
